RE: Proposed Zoning Text Amendment to Permit Chickens in All Single-Family
Residential Zoning Districts (ZTA 16-02)

I am opposed to any changes in Glendale's zoning ordinance to allow chickens to be raised and kept in all single-family zoned areas of the city, including R1-10, R1-9, R1-6 and R1-4 (residential lots ranging from 10,000 square feet to as small as 4,000 square feet). The current ordinance allows chickens to be raised in areas zoned agricultural, rural agricultural and suburban residential SR-30, SR-17 and SR-12 (larger lots). These areas are better suited for the raising of farm animals such as chickens. To allow backyard chickens in all residential areas is a very bad idea as chickens can:

- 1) Attract birds of prey and coyotes
- 2) Attract pigeons who tend to roost on neighboring rooftops. In addition to the nasty mess they make, pigeons carry numerous diseases, including *Listeria Monocytogenes*, one of the most virulent foodborne pathogens. 20 to 30% of infections in high-risk individuals may be fatal.

- 3) Chicken droppings can attract rats and a lot of flies!
- 4) Their clucking, and mere presence, can cause dogs to bark incessantly. The noise can be a very real nuisance to shift-workers, people who work from home and households with infants or small children.
- 5) If not handled properly, *Salmonella*, a food-borne disease, can be transmitted to humans by touching chickens and gathering eggs.
